## About the Texas Better Newspaper Contest

This year 169 newspapers submitted 1,703 entries in the Texas Better Newspaper Contest. The contest is broken down into 10 divisions in which newspapers compete against papers of similar circulation size.

Weeklies compete under a unique division system in which the total number of weekly entrants is divided into five divisions based on descending circulation - this year 102 weeklies entered so there were 21 newspapers each in Divisions 6-7 and 20 newspapers each in Divisions 8-10.

Dailies and Semiweeklies compete in fixed circulation breaks: Division 1 Dailies 100,000 or More (compete in General Excellence only); Division 2 Dailies 7,000 to 99,999; Division 3 Dailies Less Than

7,000; Division 4 Semiweeklies 4,001 or More; and Division 5 Semiweeklies 4,000 or Less.

First place winners receive plaques and second through fourth place winners earn certificates. Sweepstakes points are earned for each division, except Division 1, based on point accumulation in contest categories (excluding Community Service \& Special Sections) - 1st Place: 100 points; 2nd Place: 75 points; 3rd Place: 50 points; and 4th Place: 25 points. The awards were announced June 23, 2012, at the TPA Newspaper Executives' Retreat in San Antonio.

The Winners' Circle is an annual publication saluting the Better Newspaper Contest winners. Judges' comments on first through fourth place winners are reprinted along with samples of winning entries.

Through deep reporting, compelling writing and photographs and informative graphics, the Caller-Times chronicled the impact that a school district closing would have on a small rural community. Rhiannon Meyers and Michael Zamora embedded themselves in that community, and the exquisite detail reflected in their stories and images had an impact. The state of Texas gave the district another year to prove itself. This met the highest standard of public service journalism.
2. New Braunfels Herald-Zeitung: "The River Wild" - The Herald-Zeitung's in-depth series, "The River Wild," asked hard questions about the impact tubing crowds had on the river community. It documented everything - from the impact of the poor behavior of drunk tubers to the effectiveness of law enforcement and public ordinances. This helped spur action by an informed citizenship. Strong editorials and local columns added insight to that community conversation.
3. The Daily Sentinel, Nacogdoches: "Burmese refugees" - The Daily Sentinel brought enlightenment and understanding to what could have been a divisive issue - the hiring of Burmese refugees to fill factory jobs. The revelatory reporting helped this community grow.
4. Victoria Advocate: "Barefoot Sunday" - One writer's personal experience on a mission trip to Africa helped prompt empathy and compassion in her community. She built a bridge between Texas and Africa that helped bring more than 5,300 pairs of shoes to impoverished people in Malawi. That's quite an impact.

# CUTTING OR GUTTING? 

 Schools officials say potential funding cuts would be devastating to districts

Area school districts have faced the unknown before. It comes largely every two years - when the state Legislature convenes.

Planning for the unknown for the next biennium (the school years from 2011-12 and 2012-13) has area superintendents skeptical about the future of state funding, especially after hearing possible scenarios from school finance experts who are trying to interpret a draft versions of appropriations bills.

School finance experts Moak, Casey and Associates of Austin crunched the numbers presented in the House General Appropriations Act, introduced on Jan. 19, and within two days came up with three possible scenarios illustrating what cuts to the state's Foundation School Program might look like over the next two fiscal years.

While many point out these scenarios are speculative, based on the first draft of the bill, the outlook has many area superintendents concerned.

## Bracing for budgetary hurricane

On Monday, Millsap ISD Superintendent Jerry Lee Hunkapiller shared the Moak Casey estimates to a seemingly stunned school board as he explained that the state could cut $\$ 560,721$ to $\$ 924,700$ from the district's general fund.

The news seemed equally brutal for all other area districts.

The cuts are not just to the state Foundation School Program, which contributes to districts' general fund, but the appropriations legislation recommends cutting discretionary grant funds, including funds for technology infrastructure.

Perrin-Whitt Consolidated ISD Superinten-
dent John Kuhn attended a small schools summit Tuesday, which included nine area districts including Graford, Santo and Palo Pinto. As a result of the state appropriations bills currently on the table, Kuhn said school finance expert Doug Karr recommended that districts plan to cut 15 percent out of their budgets - after removing the technology grant funds.
"After running the numbers for Perrin, we will be looking for $\$ 500,142$ in reductions," Kuhn said. "Mr. Karr told us that, while these bills will change somewhat before a final version is passed, we shouldn't expect that the situation will get much better."

Mineral Wells ISD could lose up to $\$ 3.51$ million per year in state funding for the next two years, based on Moak Casey's worst-case interpretation of the first draft House Appropriations Act.

MWISD Superintendent Ronny Collins explained that in the firm's "best case scenario" the state would underfund its aid to the district, cutting $\$ 2.45$ million from the budget each year, and in the worst case - at least for Mineral Wells - the district would lose $\$ 3.51$ million in state aid, based on an anticipated 14.956 percent reduction to all Texas school districts' general funds.
"This is my 21st year of doing this and I've never seen anything as ugly as this," said Collins.
"I don't know if this is for shock value or what it is," he added of the first draft of the appropriations bill, titled House Bill 1, which recommends cutbacks to all state-funded programs.

Until Moak Casey crunched the numbers, Collins said superintendents were concerned, but didn't know the full extent of possibilities.
"Moak and Casey put a fly in the ointment when they spelled it out and ran the numbers
and people can see it's not just education losing $\$ 5$ billion [totaling $\$ 10$ billion over the biennium], it's Mineral Wells losing over $\$ 2.4$ million per year," Collins said.

He calls these figures "gutting" not "cutting."
"It's kind of asinine to be gutting our schools when you have rainy day funds that could relieve some of this and [then the state] wouldn't need this drastic of cuts," Collins added.
"It's not something we did," Collins said of the overall current school finance and state budget situation. "This is just out of the blue, saying you'll get $\$ 2.5$ million less than you had last year ... for one school year, 2011-12. It's totally out of our control."
"I feel like we're the city council of New Orleans waiting for Hurricane Katrina to hit. It's not like we can avert the hurricane. We're just waiting to clean up the damage," said Collins.

## Interpreting figures

Since most school districts are a community's largest employer, this means the area and state could lose a large portion of its workforce.

Collins suggested one way for the public to envision these proposed revenue cuts is to see how they would translate into teacher salaries, which could be more real than hypothetical.

Collins said, based on the three Moak Casey scenarios, MWISD's cuts could equate into the average salaries of 63 to 92 teachers.
"Theoretically it's possible, but practically it's tough," said Collins. "Looking at that list, [a district such as] Santo, if they hit that $\$ 806,000$ [Moak Casey's worst-case scenario for SISD], I can't image Santo would have near enough people to cut."

Besides, schools like Santo and Millsap ISD have already made staff and position cuts
in the past few years
"We will cut all supplies that we can, but with our staffing accounting for approximately 70 percent of our budget, it may require the loss of some personnel units," explained Graford ISD Superintendent Angie Myrick.
"If we have personnel cuts, our class sizes will increase dramatically causing an impact on individualized student learning," she added. "In small schools, if you decrease the number of staff, the number of preparations could increase also. This would require teachers to prepare to teach more than five different subjects a day, which would also impact student learning."

On top of the Moak Casey figures for cuts to the Foundation School Program, there are other ways programs at local schools could take a hit, since the HB1 recommends reducing discretionary grants programs.
Legislative cuts to grants could the following from the MWISD budget:

- $\$ 98,877$ technology allotment.
- $\$ 3,632$ for Discipline Alternative Education Program funding.
- $\$ 44,554$ for Student Success Initiative programs.
- $\$ 42,914$ for teen parenting programs.
- $\$ 3,250$ for the Advanced Placement incentive program.


## Reducing quality

Kuhn and Palo Pinto ISD Superintendent Eric Cederstrom noted that the appropriations bills will likely change before state legislators pass a final version.
"The simple answer is that the proposed cuts reduce our ability to provide the quality education our communities desire," Ceder-

strom said.
"It is unrealistic to believe that with less funding and higher expenditures due to unavoidable constants - payroll, utilities, fuel, unfunded mandates, etc. - that we will be able to add to our educational focus at Palo Pinto.
"Instead, we will be fighting tooth and nail to maintain our current quality of service to the community, and it's going to be a tough fight," Cederstrom added. "Hopefully our elected officials will do the same for what is right for Texas children and communities."

Kuhn said they were told not to expect the situation to get much better.
"The Tea Party is accidentally throwing our children in the harbor. I guess if you're a lawmaker you can send your kids to private school, so why would you care if the public school in your neighborhood lays off the reading specialist or the drama teacher?" Kuhn speculated.
"Nevertheless, those of us committed to our public schools will respond to all of this by buckling down and doing all we can to give the children of our towns and cities the very best education we can provide, even if it's on a shoestring budget," he added. "We'll lean on our parent groups for help, but the Perrin Community Club and [Parent Teacher Organization] already give a lot for our students and school. My teachers already buy supplies out of their own pockets - I don't know how much
more Austin expects them to give. I just wish our legislators would have the gumption to admit that the current crisis is a gift from them."

## How did we get here?

While many are quick to blame the economy, often saying a decrease in spending means fewer sales tax dollars and less state revenue, there are other reasons funding for public schools has plummeted.
Some in the public school oversight business have said lawmakers gambled and lost.

Beginning with the 2006-07 year, public school funding changed when Texas legislators reduced ad-valorem (or property) taxes by one-third and shifted the revenue source to a new franchise tax, explained Freeman.

Kuhn explained in a previous article that the 2005 school finance bill, also titled House Bill 1, provided property tax relief by telling schools they could no longer tax property owners at a maintenance and operations rate of $\$ 1.50$. Instead, he said the state lowered school districts' M\&O rates to a maximum of $\$ 1.04$ per $\$ 100$ taxable property value and gave districts an option to ask voters for up to 13 cents more through a tax ratification election.

Initially, this move was to ease the amount property owners had to pay in taxes; however, Kuhn said many didn't see the relief because of a rise in property values.

To fill the public school finance gap left by the reduced property tax, the state would contribute revenue from the new franchise tax. But there were issues with the new franchise tax, according to Freeman.
"It wasn't substantive enough to replace the revenue lost by the one-third reduction in property taxes," he said. "It has been several billion dollars a year short - since it was put into place in the 2006-07 school year - over the last two biennium."

Kuhn said he has read articles in which state representatives attribute the revenue shortfall for public schools solely to the economy and "ignore this whole school funding boondoggle."
"Karr explained to us at the summit that the business community complained about the business franchise, or activity, tax," he added. "As a result, [legislators] built in a threshold of $\$ 300,000$, which they then changed to $\$ 1$ million in annual earnings, meaning most business don't pay the tax. As a result of these loopholes, most businesses don't pay this tax and it doesn't generate enough funding to replace the lost property tax revenue."

## Make noise

Collins said he hopes citizens will create some noise and show up when their representatives and senators come to town, citing that Rep. Jim Keffer will be in town Friday.

Sen. Craig Estes, whose jurisdiction includes Parker, Palo Pinto and Jack counties, is a member of the Senate Committee on Finance.
"One of things to remember is [Moak Casey is presenting] basically three different scenarios on how the House-proposed budget might affect districts. However, the details are not sufficient enough. They are going on assumptions on three scenarios on ways the Legislature may approach the shortfall." explained Ray Freeman deputy executive director of the Equity Center, an Austin-based research and advocacy organization that promotes school finance equity and adequacy in Texas.
"Obviously, if the depth of cuts that are proposed are what finally happens, then it's going to be very detrimental to public education across Texas," he said. "That type of cut in state funding for public education is unprecedented and unheard of and will be a catastrophe for public schools."

Freeman said he hopes legislators will consider "moving forward for what's best for Texans."
"There are several things that can be done and a lot of different groups are working on ways to offset these shortfalls. We think there are several things legislators can do without being as detrimental to education and other areas like Health and Human Services," he said.

# 20 YEARS, NO ARRESTS <br> Father won't let murder case die

It was a newspaper carrier, out on the streets early that Tuesday morning, who found the woman.
On the side of Interstate 10 in Vidor, a black Mercury Tracer was nose down in a ditch, resting on a culvert.
Kathy Fulton sat in the driver's seat, her head back on the headrest. The paper carrier told dispatchers there had been a car accident.
But that wasn't what happened.
Investigators didn't find any blood on the outside of her gray shirt or the fabric of her white jeans, but it had stained her hair and undergarments.
She was 34 , blonde and dead.
The conclusion after an autopsy? Homicide.
The mother of two had been beaten and strangled, cleaned up and dressed in her clothes, and then placed in the car in a staged accident, the medical examiner said. It was May 14, 1991, the first day in the search for her killer, a case in which no arrests have ever been made.

## Who killed Kathy?

It's been 20 years, and James Fulton has spent each day, every day, thinking about what happened to his daughter.
Her daughters, Monica and Erin Page, for years flipped calendars from May to June, enduring a series of motherless Mother's Days.
And for 20 years, Dave Shows, then a Vidor patrol sergeant and now the chief, has walked into the department without an answer.
Most everyone can agree on this:
Kathy and her husband, Steve, had separated days earlier. On May 12, Mother's Day, they all went to the beach. Steve fried shrimp for dinner then spent his first night alone in a new apartment just across the

## freeway.

On the night of May 13, Kathy and Steve drove separately to the girls' softball game. After the game, the kids went to sleep at the family house, and Kathy asked Steve to come over while she went out with girlfriends.
Instead, she went to Beaumont to meet a furniture salesman from San Antonio. They had sex at a Best Western.
That man, who volunteered for a polygraph and was cleared, said Kathy left around 2:30 a.m. Steve, who wasn't ever charged in the case, said she never came home.
Somehow, she ended up in her Mercury, redressed in the same outfit but missing her socks, earrings, watch and ring. Her makeup had been washed off.
The autopsy cleared some things up: she wasn't drinking or pregnant, or a casualty of a disease or sudden medical problem. There wasn't enough urine for a drug screen, but a blood test showed that Valium was the only thing in her system.
Still, there were questions.
The examination confirmed that Kathy had sex that night, though there was no sperm present. Two men said they had slept with her: the man from the hotel, who said he wore a condom, and Steve, who had a vasectomy performed months earlier.
Kathy was getting out of the shower before her date, Steve testified, and they'd had sex on the kitchen floor. She freshened up, but didn't take another shower, and headed out the door.
He never saw her alive again, he said.

## 'Everything went to hell'

On the morning she would die, things seemed to be going all right for Kathy Page. She was waiting tables at the Hoffbrau restaurant on 11th Street and taking classes at Lamar University. Although struggling with her strained marriage, she was trying to set things up so the girls
would have both mother and father in their lives.
Erin Page doesn't remember much about May 14 that year, or when she learned the death was a homicide. Her dad didn't talk about it, didn't take them to therapy, she said. They grew up estranged from Kathy's side of the family.
Each member of the family dealt with the loss separately. Steve would sit in the living room, Erin said, while she would sit in her bedroom. Monica went to a friend's house down the street. Their grief was private.
"When my mom died, everything went to hell," Erin said. "The craziness became normal."

## An 'Unsolved Mystery'

Kathy's father, James Fulton, said he got along with his son-in-law just fine while Steve and Kathy were married. He told the police they should be looking at someone else, not Steve, in their search for the killer. But after months without an end in sight, James started to piece together things that had happened since he learned about his daughter's death.
A grease stain on the home's carpet, the disappearance of Kathy's watch collection, the sexual encounter with Steve before Kathy left that evening. And why, her family wondered, would Steve not take a polygraph?
Ever since, James has done everything he could think of to convince the world that Steve killed Kathy.
He painted roadside signs. He put her story on "Unsolved Mysteries." He took out ads in the Vidorian newspaper in six-month increments. He paid for Interstate 10 billboards accusing the police department of botching the case.
He hired a private investigator, who got video footage of Steve kicking over flowers on Kathy's grave. Later, Steve pleaded guilty to desecration of a grave, paid a
$\$ 500$ fine and got three years' probation.
"This is an unusual charge," said Orange "County's attorney, John Kimbrough.
"It's not related to the murder case in anyway, but in my heart, I believe the case will be solved one day."

## No arrests

When Steve first was served with a civil lawsuit filed by the Fultons, he gave it to Erin to read. He said nothing.
"He just handed me the papers," she said. "And I remember reading them and asking him, 'They think you killed her?""
That wrongful lawsuit ended in a mistrial. A second lawsuit ended in a hung jury. A third went to court in October 1999.
"I gather from questions in prior hearings that the theory is that Kathy came home, and somehow you found out she was having an affair and you killed her. Is that what happened?" Steve's lawyer asked during that hearing.
"No, sir," Steve testified. "It did not happen."
"Did you cry when you found out your wife had been killed?" asked the Fulton family's lawyer.
"No, sir, I didn't. When you receive shocking news ...'
"Just answer the question," Steve was told. By a vote of 11 to 1 , the jury found Steve liable in Kathy's death. It ordered him to pay $\$ 150,000$ to the Fulton family $\$ 50,000$ on his youngest daughter's behalf. The ruling was upheld on appeal.
James Fulton updated his billboards.
"Found Responsible for Wife's Death in Civil Court. Appeals Court Upheld Conviction. Pleaded 'Guilty' of Desecrating Her Grave. CRIMINAL CASE: NO ARRESTS!"
"This is my only option," James told The Enterprise in 1994. "I'll go this way from now. I'll keep the signs, put up bigger ones

We're proud to work in an industry that tries its best to provide the kind of authoritative information people need in a fast-paced, often confusing world.

We know that good, honest facts will always lead to better outcomes for our community, something that matters just as much here in Hunt County as it does in New York City or Washington, D.C.

It's a sexy thing indeed.

## ＇I need a conviction＇

For Chief Dave Shows，who was dispatched to the scene 20 years ago，Vidor＇s only unsolved killing is a nagging presence，like a smudge on a pair of sunglasses．
He wants the case solved．He wants the signs down．He wants James，who turned 80 this year，to find peace
But there are snags－no witnesses，for instance．
＂There＇s elements to this offense that are missing，＂Shows says vaguely．The department has＂persons of interest，＂ he says，but the trouble is finding evidence to produce in court，proof beyond a reasonable doubt．
Since it＇s an ongoing investigation，records from the de－ partment remain sealed，even to the Fultons．
James keeps six boxes of paperwork and tape recordings from his investigations．He estimates he＇s spent about $\$ 150,000$ trying to find an answer．The girls moved to Ala－ bama with Steve shortly after Kathy＇s death．Monica，the younger of the two，died earlier this year at 27 from an accidental overdose，Erin said．
＂My mother was a person who really struggled in her life
and when she died，I feel like that turmoil really passed on to（Monica），＂Erin said．

## Justice delayed

Family members have different theories on what led to Kathy＇s death．
Erin believes Kathy might have been killed by someone she dated or met at the Hoffbrau．She thinks her mom could have been doing drugs，and maybe the killer was someone who ran with that crowd．
＂I think it had to do with probably her putting someone off and then for him to turn around and find out，＂she says． ＂The last time she was seen was 2 a．m．leaving a hotel with a man．I＇m sure immediately after that she was con－ fronted．＂
To this day，James Fulton believes three things：Kathy was
choked to death while being raped；her husband is respon－ sible；and the Vidor Police Department did not conduct an effective investigation．
＂If it would have been anywhere else，it would have been solved，＂he says．
It＇s a charge Shows and former detective Ray Moseley deny．The case was handled professionally，they say，and they still hope to close it．
＂Justice delayed is better than no justice at all，＂Shows says．
＂We did everything we could do at that time，＂Moseley says．＂We spent night and day on that thing for several months．＂
Could things have been done differently？
＂I don＇t want to go there，＂Moseley says．
Erin，now the mother of two，doesn＇t think her mother＇s killer will ever be named．She said years after the crime， someone with the police told her they had been unsuccess－ ful because they were inexperienced．

# THE DIGNITY OF HARD WORK

Everybody ought to have my late friend Louie Wear's work ethic.

For the 20 or so years I knew him, as his tenant and his friend, Louie was a man who knew how to think on his feet. Even if thinking on his feet meant he was planning out his next project as happened in his later years - while seated in a wheelchair.

He'd lost part of one leg years before, but that didn't stop Louie from swinging a hammer or dragging a paintbrush.
"Don't ever give up," he used to tell me, though of course there must have been times when he was saying this, aloud, to rally his own flagging spirits. "Once you quit tryin', you're through."

Louie had been raised for farming and ranching. But - as he told it, decades after the fact - you can't irrigate with your own sweat. Neither can you will the crops to grow.

Texas' epic drought of the 1950s, followed by a daughter being struck with polio, drove Louie out of full-time farming - although he was never without a vegetable garden and rarely without a couple of hogs around the old Andice homestead.

He took what work he could find and he worked - as he put it so well - "from can till can't."

At different times, Louie might have been driving a water truck for the highway department or running a beer joint. Always, he kept a hand in carpentry.

No honest work was beneath him and - John Wayne fan that he was - Louie would be proud to know he reminds me of a movie character Duke Wayne once played.

In the Western/comedy "McLintock," the ranch baron Wayne plays is forced to defend himself after a young whipper-
snapper he's hired takes a swing at him.
The younger man - from a newly arrived family of down-on-their-luck sodbusters - has swallowed his pride to practically beg for work. He has a widowed mother and younger siblings to support.
But he is embarrassed by his circumstances and fisticuffs ensue. The kid ends up knocked to the ground and then dusting off the seat of his pants.
"I don't know what got into me," the young man says. "I suppose I ought to thank you for giving me a job."
"Listen, sonny," Duke replies. "I don't give jobs. I hire men. You put in a fair day's work and I pay you a fair day's wages. That way, we can both keep our heads up."

That cinematic exchange - that line of dialogue ("I don't give jobs. I hire men.") has stayed with me over the years.

I think about it at this time of year, around Labor Day, but it's never really far from my consciousness.

For several years now, there's been a lot of talk about how foreign-born workers are coming to the United States and accepting jobs home-grown Americans are no longer willing to do - mowing lawns, digging ditches, plucking chickens and the like.

It's not that Americans have gotten lazy. That's not quite the right word to describe it.
It's about a change in values I have seen during my lifetime, as "menial job" has gone from being a contradiction in terms to a compound noun.

Two tragedies have unfolded here: It's about some of us thinking we're too good to get our hands dirty. And it's about some of us having no respect for people who do get their hands dirty.

About 10 years go, I was telling a family member who'd just turned 16
that I saw a certain grocery store was hiring overnight shelf stockers for $\$ 10$ an hour.

The boy had his driver's license. And he had access to a vehicle. But he also had an attitude.

So when I told him about the job, he rolled his eyes, and then I wanted to ring his neck.

One skates on thin ice, chastising the children of family members, but now looking back - I regret that I held my tongue.

I regret I did not say what I was thinking. Which was: "Watch it, boy. I've done that work for half the wages and I've done it as a grown man."

I came across another example of this contempt for manual labor - this shift in our cultural values regarding work - during a Round Rock school board meeting I covered in the 1990s.

A guest speaker was addressing the school board, trying to sell trustees on the computer-in-every-classroom idea.

Without computer skills, the man said, high school graduates wouldn't be able to find any jobs, "except in construction."
"Why you arrogant offspring of a female dog," I thought. "Who are you going to get to build your house? A philosophy major?"

Back then - just before hooking up with the Leader - I'd been working in the low-skill end of the construction trade: hauling roofing shingles up a ladder here, tearing down an old shack there, filling sand bags for concrete foundation work somewhere else.

Sure, I had prior training and experience for the work I do now. But I was between newspaper gigs then. And besides, I wasn't born with a pen and notebook in my hands. I've had to work other jobs, until opportunities to prove myself as a writer presented themselves.

Although it is statistically true, that most people end up in the same economic class they were born into and grew up in, there is so much anecdotal evidence to the contrary that no one should ever give up the hope of making a better life.
Although some people will - for a variety of reasons - always have lowpaying jobs, most people can improve their condition, either from within their own line of work or by moving to another line of work.

Sometimes these transitions are the link between one generation and the next. The Irish-American template comes to mind. The first generation off the boat dug ditches. Subsequent generations produced cops, priests, lawyers, judges and political leaders.
I presume the same pattern of progression will hold true for our modernday Mexican immigrants.
A brief digression: The Spanishspeaking gentleman who cleans this office - when we are both here after 5 p.m. every Friday - recently told me he just became an American citizen. I am bursting with pride for him.
Sweaty, dirty, low-paying honest work still has dignity. Because the men and women who perform these jobs are human beings and so they - inherently are born with a dignity others can neither add to nor detract from.
The way I was raised - the way a lot of people were raised - you don't measure a man or woman by the size of their bank account. Every honest, hard-working person deserves respect for what they do.
I am not sure that we - as an American people - really believe in that anymore.
And that's a shame.
Because Louie Wear and the Duke had it right.
